

They may give us a new mask to wear and I will get a special bracelet.








Next, we will sit down and wait until my name is called. I will put my bracelet on my wrist, so the doctors know my name and birthday.



When it's my turn, someone will say my name.

Then, we'll all walk to a new room.








When we get to the new room, I will stand on a scale to see how much I weigh.



Next, I will stand up straight against the wall to see how tall I am.

I might feel a light tap on my head.







Next, a cloth will be placed on my arm and I will feel a tight squeeze.




This is OK. I can remember to hold my body still and take deep breaths.



Next, my finger will be placed in something with a red light, called a pulse oximeter.

It will measure the oxygen in my body.







Next, I will listen to music. I will put a headphone in each of my ears. I can help by holding the machine and watching until the light turns green.







Next, the lights will be turned off and I'll look at a fun camera. I may see colored lights and hear birds chirping.





When it's my turn, the doctor will come and say, "Hi."

The doctor may ask us questions to learn more about how to help me stay healthy.



Next, the doctor will listen to my heart and lungs with a stethoscope.

The doctor might ask me to take big, deep breaths.







The doctor will use a little flashlight to look in my ears and mouth.







Next, the doctor will use a magnifying glass, like this, to look at my eyes.



If I'm not feeling well, the doctor will check my temperature. A thermometer will gently slide across my forehead.





When my check-up is all done, I may get a prize or stickers!



Everyone will be so proud of me!
